Communion. If you are a practicing Christian of any denomination, and normally receive Communion in your home church, you are welcome to receive at the Lord's Altar.

Distribution of Communion: Congregants are advised to receive the host first from the President and then move to receive the chalice. The Welcomers will bring people up section by section and if you wish to stay seated in your place, we will come to you at the end of communion. If you do not wish to receive you are welcome to come for a blessing - indicating by holding your service book.

If you require a gluten-free wafer, or would like to receive communion seated, do let one of the stewards know. Because of cross contamination (for someone who is gluten free) we have taken the decision to ask that you refrain from Intinction (dipping) of the host into the chalice.

Refreshments will be served today after the service.

Bishops of Man and the Isles

The Names on the Cathedral Floor
Gamaliel 1160. An Englishman, consecrated by
Roger, Archbishop of York, in 1154.13 He died in
1181, and was buried in the abbey at Peterborough.
In 1154, November 30, by the Bull of Anastasius IV,
the See of Man was annexed to Trondheim, and
remained for upwards of four centuries, long after the
suzerainty of Norway over Man had passed away.

The Lectionary

You will have noted that we have different readings every Sunday. These readings come from the Common lectionary which is used by the majority churches around the world.

One of the major reasons for having a lectionary is so that each Sunday congregations should get to hear, over three years, most of the Bible.

C S Lewis in the Screwtape Letters made comment on the risk of always picking favorite passages and thus missing out on the breadth and depth of scripture.

The lectionary used by the Church of England has readings for 3 services every day. Each year there is a focus on either Matthew, Mark or Luke the three synoptic gospels.

St Johns gospel tends to appear during special seasons such as Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, and Easter.

The Majority of the New Testament appears in the in the lectionary but that is not true of the Old Testament which is a lot longer. Because of this a number of the Books of the Old Testament get little or no mention.

The lectionary also suggests one or more Psalms to be read at each service, At the Cathedral the Psalm is normally only used at Evening Prayer services.

The breadth of the lectionary is a good start for getting to understand the Bible but is not a great substitute for personal Bible reading which should be the goal of every Christian.

There are many different styles of Bible notes etc which people can access if they wish to explore this further.
